Recycling is a loosely connected, highly dependent network riddled with inefficiencies and issues.



Recycling is working in South Carolina.

But like other states, it faces challenges including:

- Complacency
- Confusion

Contamination

Contamination has increased costs for local government programs.

- It has reduced value of commodities for local governments.
- Processors are charging more.



About 10 local governments have expressed concerns about maintaining their recycling programs. One municipal program has closed.



This is an opportunity to clean up our act.

DHEC is encouraging focusing the message on:

- Aluminum and steel cans;
- Paper (particularly cardboard); and
- Plastic

Every program accepts these items. Beyond that, check.





Grant Funding

- For FY 2020, the Office plans to make available about \$1.3 million in recycling funds for schools, colleges and local governments.
- Priority funding will go to proposals designed to increase the MSW recycling rate, and to projects that support the Don't Waste Food SC and RecycleMoreSC programs.
