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

The Direct Route

- Department Head
- City or County Attorney
- Review language or draft ordinance
- City or County Manager
- Mayor or Council Member
- Council Can Approve or Refuse

WHERE DO WE START

Indirect Route

- Ordinance proposals can start in different ways
 - Local Politician
 - Private Citizen
 - Departments / Councils/ Committees

PROPOSAL

- Apply for a spot on council agenda to present draft of ordinance
 - Procedures may vary
- Try to meet with recycling friendly council members before you present
- Have handouts ready
- Make sure you are informed and ready to answer tough questions

IF AT FIRST YOU DON'T SUCCEED...

- You may have to present several times
- Get community support
- Get your message out!
 - TV, Print, Radio and Social Media
- Compromise if needed

Why is solid waste enforcement important?

- Improper disposal of waste is illegal!
- Citizen demand
- Enhances perceptions of the community
- Protects public health and the environment



Enforcement Authority

G.S. 153A-136. Regulation of solid wastes.

- (a) A county may by ordinance regulate the storage, collection, transportation, use, disposal, and other disposition of solid wastes. Such an ordinance may:
- (1) Regulate the activities of persons, firms, and corporations, both public and private.
- (6a) Regulate the illegal disposal of solid waste, including littering on public and private property, provide for enforcement by civil penalties as well as other remedies, and provide that such regulations
- may be enforced by county employees specially appointed as environmental enforcement officers.




Impact of Contamination

 - 10 weeks in Cincinnati







Lessons Learned

- People are generally confused on what they can recycle
- Customers were unaware that there was a list of acceptable items on their cart.
- The curbside communication didn't generate that many phone calls
- Feet on the street team need to be passionate
- Leaving the material at the curb works.



The Results

- Fairfield 22% contamination rate 12% contamination rate
- Centerville 19% contamination rate 11% contamination rate
- Cincinnati 28% contamination rate 19% contamination rate

- Part of the Triad Region of North Carolina
- 3rd largest city in NC
- Started the first single stream recycling program on the East Coast in 1992 and still working with the original MRF, despite changes in ownership over the past few years.

(FYI... recycling carts are brown)







Recycling at a Glance



- 90,100 households
- Every other week collection
- Municipally operated collection
- ~20-30% contamination rate*
- 25,000 tons annually



Tagging Program

- Tagging program started in July 2018
- 10 Recycling drivers and 1 inspector tag
- Enforcement with rejection
- 3 strikes you're out
- 12,000+ interactions with residents to date



Why we started...



Education + Policy

- You cannot have one without the other.
- "Feet on the street" limited to one employee (used to be 4)
- Contamination rates 18% or more since 2015.
- Longstanding program=well engrained bad behaviors
 - Bagged recycling
 - Bags/wrap in recycling
 - Using the brown bin as a spare trash cart
 - Confusing colors... brown is recycle, green is trash
 - Textiles, construction waste, yard waste, food, garbage, you name it... it ends up in the brown bin.



Drivers vs. Inspectors

- See contamination
 - Sticking out of the cart
 - In the hopper (via camera)
- **Don't** have time to physically tag a cart with an oops or skipped sticker.
- Equipped with a tablet to virtually tag a cart.



Inspector

- See contamination
 - Sticking out of the cart
 - When the lid is opened
- Does have time to physically tag a cart with an oops or skipped sticker.
- Equipped with a tablet to virtually tag a cart.





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The Follow-up

Postcards:

- Created daily (for the previous days tags)
- Process using an Excel Macro
- Convert into address labels
- Print sheet that includes address, violation, and contamination type
- Create postcards
 - Date stamp
 - File folder labels for common contaminants
 - Plastic bags are #1 by far, so default contaminant.

Enforcement

On the post card, it says: This is you ____ notice of contamination, if your container is in violation again, it will be removed for non-compliance with recycling guidelines.

We are not in the business of removing recycling carts—but this message is not sugar coated due to our heavy contamination issues.

6-month roll off rule: After 6 months, a tag rolls off of an address (no longer pulled in the reports run). That allows for this to function as and be branded as an education program so that folks won't get tagged 3 times over 2 years and get their cart removed...

Because we say we will remove their carts, it gets residents' attention! They call us, they talk to us, and we err on the side of the resident.




Mistakes happen

Because we say we will remove their carts, it gets residents' attention!

Sometimes we tag the wrong address (the cart wasn't full, resident out of town, they KNOW they didn't have THAT in there, etc...).

We always try to err on the side of the resident. Each situation is different. If they have multiple tags, but are trying to do the right thing, we will remove a tag and tell them about the 6 month roll off rule.


Tracking

Total Violations by Service Day FY 20-21






Total Number of Violations, FY 18-19



Total Number of Violations, FY 20-21






