8:00 AM - 3:00 PM Tour - Compost is the Wave of the Future

Off Site

Join us for a fantastic tour all about composting! In operation since 1981, the New Hanover County landfill is the states first lined landfill, exceeding federal and state requirements. With a history of sustainability innovation, the NHC Landfill has the first municipally owned construction and demolition diversion program in the state (C&D), is the first municipality in NC to compost food waste, has the only double reverse osmosis leachate treatment in state, and also boasts a unique constructed wetland system for additional leachate treatment. NHC Environmental Management staff will explain the in-vessel composting system named 'Huckleberry', give a behind the scenes tour to the leachate treatment facility, outline the development of the landfill gas collection system, and describe the hiring partnership with local organization LINC. Tour participants will receive box lunches from UNCW Campus Dining at the NHC Landfill for a picnic lunch. Participants will then head to the Wilmington Compost Company's site, located just over the county line in Pender County at Piney Run Farms. Learn how the former LCID (Land-clearing and Inert Debris) landfill has recently changed operators who are bringing the site into compliance while also seeking to expand their composting permit from Type 1 to Type 3, so food waste can be composted on site. Participants will need to load the bus between 8-8:30am, the bus will depart the Wilmington Convention Center at 8:30am. Cost: \$100, includes transportation.
