

10 Curbside Programs


68 Drop-off Programs

Challenges for Rural Recycling

- Low population density
- Higher cost per household
- Distant markets
- Lower per capita tax revenue streams
- Limited staffing
- Population may fluctuate with tourism seasons


Rural Counties Provide More Services to Municipal Residents!

Recommendations

- Optimize collection: commingling, compacting, hub and spoke models
- Engage with partners: local governments, corporate partners, community organizations
- Utilize funding sources:
 - Household fees, tipping fees
 - Solid Waste Disposal Tax Distributions, Electronics Management Funds
 - Grants
- Consider rural curbside
- Make the most of education



Hub and Spoke Systems





Benefits of Hub and Spoke

- Allows single stream recycling further away from MRF
- Opportunity to modernize collection
- Can help small and/or remote communities:
 - Implement new recycling programs
 - Increase recovery
 - Reduce operational costs

Benefits of Hub and Spoke

Consolidation allows for more efficient transportation

 Purchasing power with larger volumes to negotiate MRF contracts

Opportunity to QC materials and remove obvious contaminants

Partner on education with all participating communities









Hub and Spoke Options

- Use existing waste transfer station
 - Share one bay
 - Use separate bay for recycling
- Create a separate transfer system for recycling
 - Recycling "transfer station" using trailers
 - Consolidate using compacting roll-offs
 - Bale and haul in van trailers

Orange County Glass Bunker

Grant funded in 2018 Consolidate glass from:

- Alamance County drop-offs
- Durham County drop-offs
- Orange County drop-offs
- Orange County commercial

AFTER: 1 TRIP PER MONTH AT \$108 PER TRIP

SAVINGS OF \$2,592 IN 6 MONTHS

DANIELTOWN SITE

BEFORE: 12 TRIPS PER MONTH AT \$108 PER TRIP

AFTER: <u>2 TRIPS PER</u>
<u>MONTH</u> AT \$72 PER TRIP

SAVINGS OF \$6,912 IN 6 MONTHS





- 65 counties have household fees
- 36 counties (55%)
 have increased fees
 in past 5 years
- \$123 average annual fee in FY2019-20






FY2022 Public Recycling Programs




Programs for Hard to Recycle Materials




Household Hazardous Waste
